## Film Review - Burning Man. Rated MA15+

Just because grieving is a complex and emotional process, that doesn't automatically carry across to the script and the actors' performances.

On the brighter side, Burning Man featured some incredible cinematography and absurd Australia humor: A car transporting raw meat gets into an accident. The paramedics think scattered red meat chunks are human parts and prepare for the worst.

## SCREENING IN AUGUST - His Girl Friday, 1940

His Girl Friday is adapted from a 1928 play and a 1931 film about the newspaper business called The Front Page. In 1940 director Howard Hawks decided to use Cary Grant's skills as one of the funniest actors of all time to make the film brighter and breezier, with wisecracks and dialogue delivered with "the speed an accuracy of a Spitfire". Cary Grant had the skill to quickly turn from comedy to the poignant and dramatic and to play a cynical character who could also be noble and dramatic.

In a sign of the times a reviewer in June 1940 said "(the) picture ... flashes by you before you have had time to remember that for an hour and a half you have forgotten the war."

But His Girl Friday is more than war-time escapism. According to Variety magazine His Girl Friday "feels contemporary in a way that many old films don't because the humor is so organic to the characters". And the humor is dark:

Hildy Johnson: "Walter, you're wonderful, in a loathsome sort of way."

"I swear it on my mother's grave!" "Your mother's still alive." "Allright, my grandmother's grave - don't be technical"

McCue, reporter: "Pete, why can't you hang this guy at 5 o'clock instead of 7?"

Bensinger: "Sure, it won't hurt you and we can make the City Edi-

Sheriff Hartwell: "Oh, well, now that's kind of raw... I can't hang a man in his sleep just to please a newspaper."
